

MENTAL ILLNESS _____

A lot has been said recently about this type of illness that so many people struggle with, both here in New Zealand, as well as world-wide. I am writing this as an attempt to help others. Please do call if you have questions.

It took me a long time to come to terms with myself, I felt ashamed and trusted very few people. I did not tell my children, family or friends. I found my moods swung between very high and very low, and my sleeping was disrupted. My G.P. organized for me to go to Sunnyside Hospital (now called Hillmorton Hospital), where nurses and doctors worked with me and my G.P. and family. I and the other outpatients there regularly talk about our situations, and I also have my own case manager. I found this system very helpful, and I remain an outpatient there.

We are learning that we are people with a mental illness but are loved by our family and friends and also that we are not idiots. We must try not to struggle, e.q. thinking about suicide. It would be wrong to put our families (or brothers, sisters, mum and dad, grandparents) through the pain of losing a loved one. Instead, we should love (unconditionally) those love us unconditionally. They deserve it, and we must not be selfish but look after them and ourselves. I do not have to be ashamed to be kind and trust people again.

ESTUARY EDGE UPDATE

Many thanks to those of you that took time to respond to the recent survey regarding the appointment of a Technical Expert for Southshore for the Earthquake Legacy Project / Estuary Edge protection. The outcome of the survey was as follows:

The number of households in Southshore are 485. We had 150 responses - 31% of the community. 149 nominated Gary Teear as our Technical Expert, 1 disagreed.

This means that over 99.99% of the community backed Gary Teear.

On this basis we confirm support from the Southshore community for the SSRA proposal to nominate Gary Teear. We have advised CCC and Gary Teear of the outcome, and activity is underway towards commencing the project in earnest in early 2020.


BRIDGE STREET COMMUNITY HUB

DOG CONTROL IN SOUTHSHORE



As an addendum to the October Beacon where the issue of dogs which are not under effective control was raised in the (Southshore Spit) reserve. [N.B. We see many dogowners who are responsible and do have their dogs on a lead on the reserve].

Events in the last few weeks have expanded this concern. We had an elderly chicken in our garden and a dog entered our property from Rocking Horse Road on November 28th and killed our chicken. It seems that we have neighbours who have chickens on the beachside

of Rocking Horse Road. Dog(s) apparently enter the back garden of these neighbours via the dunes, and then kill chickens. We have observed people who bring dog(s) to the reserve in a car, and then simply open the door of the car and the group of dogs bound out into the reserve. This does not seem to comply with the requirement to keep dogs under effective control at all times in the Reserve. We cycle frequently down the estuary edge and often owners seen unable to restrain their unleaded dogs from chasing and snapping at us and other cyclists.

It seems to us that these incidents raise two issues:

- For the reserve, is it appropriate that dog owners should see this as a place to walk dogs at all?
- For other public places is it ever appropriate for dog-owners to allow their dogs to enter other people's property?

There is a regular opportunity soon to review the dog rules on the reserve. We have asked SSRA to pursue these matters.

CHICKENS: IF YOU CAN'T BEAT 'EM, EAT 'EM

This is a version of a light-hearted, tongue-in-cheek article by Lynda Hallinan under her Self-Sufficiently Lynda column series in the Dominion Post (Wellington), 2008-2010

If the battery chicken-farming industry needs a public relations spokeswoman, let me be the first to volunteer. Let me state publicly that I fully support locking up hens in small cages that they cannot escape from...especially my hens.

When I moved into the country this year, keeping chooks was as high on my list as keeping my man. I wasn't allowed to have chooks in the city: my section was too small, my street too sub-divided to meet the bylaw requirements: (they must be housed in a chook run at least 10m from any dwelling and at least 3m from a boundary.

My country chooks have no such space restrictions. They range free through paddocks by day, before returning to their run at night. They're happy hens, healthy hens, clucky contented hens....unlike their caged cousins.

Or at least that's the theory, but don't believe everything you're told by animal activists. Free-range hens aren't the imperturbable, blithe birds you might think they are...they're bitches, cunning crafty, callous, ruthless, vegetable garden-raiding bitches. They're such bitches that, whenever I cuss them, they actually think I'm calling them by name. They come running.

Give free-range hens an inch and they'll take a hectare. This week my seven red shavers shredded my peony poppies, reducing them to mangled stumps. They pecked the petals off my Prospero roses, scoffed two dozen sunflower seedlings and ate a row of Cos lettuces. They nibbled my dwarf peas and demolished the rhubarb, again. Rhubarb leaves are toxic, but clearly someone forgot to tell my chooks. They have cast-iron constitutions as well as questionable morals.

I blame the rooster for leading them astray. He taught them how to fly the coop. So, we clipped their wings. Then he taught them how to jump through the small gap between the top two wooden fence railings.

It was the final straw. I bought a \$179.90 roll of chicken wire and transformed the chook run into Fort Knox. The chicken wire's so high, they can't get over it. Its so low, they can't get under it. And if they do? I'll eat the bitches. You can buy a lot of eggs for \$179.90.

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Gardening Tips by Lee Osborne

CHRISTMAS COLOUR



Euphorbias are an intriguing group of plants with the common name spurge. It's the largest plant genus with over 2000 species and many more varieties. Some are weeds but many are very desirable plants. Most display chartreuse (bright yellowgreen) colour around the flowers but a few are orange or red. Their floral displays last well because they have modified leaves called bracts rather than delicate petals to attract pollinators to the tiny flowers. Poinsettia is the best known of all, its bright red colour making great decoration at Christmas, but there are many that are nothing like these. Most grow easily outside, unlike poinsettia which is tender and fussy. I love the ones with beautiful glaucous (blue-green) foliage. Many have milky sap that burns and blisters the skin and causes painful temporary blindness. The common weed called spurge has this nasty



white sap. If sap enters the eye irrigate with water for 15 minutes and get medical attention. Gloves, long sleeves and glasses are wise precautions. Just a few drops of sap in a pond will kill fish and other pond life. So beware the sap but realise that it is what keeps them looking lush and is why not many creatures chew them. Always clean secateurs thoroughly after pruning them because the sap sticks the blades together and dried sap retains its toxicity. They include short-lived species, perennials, shrubs and succulent species resembling cacti. The most common shrubby one goes by two names. E. characias is the legitimate name but they were also named E. wulfenii for a time until it was realised they are the same. The bluish foliage is lovely and the variegated forms are particularly attractive. E. mellifera has interesting green leaves and orangey flowers

that smell strongly of honey. Those two shrubby types grow very well in our harsh conditions but there is an even tougher one which is more of a ground cover. E. cyparissias or Cypress Spurge is a recent discovery for me. I bought one from the Friends of the Botanic Gardens plant stand. When I looked it up I found it is so drought tolerant it can thrive in pure sand. It dies down in winter in our climate so you wouldn't give it pride of place but when it shoots away in spring its leaves have a lovely purple tinge followed by bright yellow flowers. Because it is short and has fine leaves incorrect advice has been given that it makes a good rockery plant but its spreading nature means this is very bad advice which has sullied its reputation. It is very suitable for large areas providing colour for much longer than other euphorbias. E. glauca is the silverblue native one used in coastal landscaping projects such as along the estuary edge at the Ebbtide St entrance to South Brighton domain. Where there is more shelter the following are useful and attractive: E. polychroma, E. griffithii 'Fireglow' (stunning but needs moisture and good soil to do well) and E. martinii which has gorgeous purple tones. Whether or not you buy a poinsettia pre-Christmas or stick to proper outdoor euphorbias I wish you a safe and enjoyable summer break.
